HEAVY COST TO THE RATES.

At the monthly meeting of the County Galway Homes Committee held at Loughrea a letter was received from the County Board of Health suggesting that a maternity ward be set up at the County Home (Loughrea) for unmarried mothers.

The Secretary stated that every illegitimate hild costs £300 a year to the rates of the county, and during the past year there were fifty-four such children in the County Galway; so that the debt placed upon the ratepayers in respect of that year was £16,200.

On the motion of Mr. G. Lynch, seconded by Mr. S. O'Connor (Ballinasloe), a resolution as adopted calling upon the Government to introduce legislation giving power to commit

second offenders to a Magdalen asylum.

The question of providing accommodation for unmarried mothers other than in the Central Hospital, Galway, was adjourned to next meeting, when a motion in the name of Mr. G. Lynch will be considered re the continuance of contract with Bon Secours Sisters in charge of the Children's Home at Tuam at the existing rate, which the Committee considers exorbitant.
